What could you not live without?

I remember leading a youth session some time ago and we started with an ice breaker style question. If your house was on fire and you could only grab three things, what would you save? I think the answers given were generally the cat and my phone. The third option was harder for them to choose.

We had a practice of this earlier this week. I've just come back from a few days camping in the broads. Camping is a good way of measuring the size of your car. The boot seems huge until you add in the tent, and then you have to choose what you will take and what you will leave behind. Do I want to take a stand for the cooker, or do I want an airbed to sleep on? If we take the inflatable canoe, what can we leave behind to fit it in? Is it going to rain, or can I leave my coat behind and chance it? You get the idea.

I think we did better than our friends we camped with, and there was a certain amount of smugness that we have an extra child to them, and yet they needed a roof box and a trailer. Perhaps I am less attached to my stuff than they are (or more mean to my children who had to leave a lot of stuff behind!)

Jesus spoke of the risk of storing up treasures here on earth and urged us to instead build the kingdom of God. He knew that the risk is that our 'stuff' becomes more important than seeking God. Perhaps having a smaller car is a good thing – it makes camping decisions easier and encourages us to seek God, rather than becoming attached to our stuff.

¹⁹ "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰ but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹ For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. (Matthew 6:19 – 21)

I hope you are all able to have a break this summer and that your holiday is as sunny as the few days I have just had.

Face to face Services

This Sunday will be the last in our series of evening services in church – at least until September as I have not got people to provide holiday cover for me. We will meet at St Mary's at 6.30pm on Sunday for evening prayer.

If you have kept up with the news, you will know that the law on face coverings will change on Saturday 8th August, requiring them to be worn in church (and other places). The government guidance on how this works is still being prepared as I write this (Thursday 6th) but the C of E website gives these details:

From 8 August, face coverings are also required by law to be worn in a greater number of public indoor settings including places of worship, museums, galleries, cinemas and public libraries.

There are valid exemptions for some individuals and groups not to wear a face covering in these settings. In particular, **those who are leading services** or events in a place of worship, and those who assist them (for instance by **reading**, **preaching**, or **leading prayer**) do not always need to wear a face covering, although one should be worn especially if physical distancing cannot be maintained (i.e. distributing consumables). This exemption does not apply to worshippers, who should wear face coverings consistent with the requirements for any other public space.

I will continue to wear a face shield whilst leading services and I ask that, unless you are exempt from wearing a face covering, you come prepared with one to the services.

On Sunday 30th August at 10.30am, I plan to lead a communion service outside in the churchyard of St John's Brightwell. As it is a churchyard being used for a service of public worship, there is no limit to numbers, but we will need to socially distance. If you would like to come, please bring your own chair and, if possible, your own hand sanitiser – there is no running water at St John's. As things stand at the moment, we will still be unable to sing, despite being outside, and I don't know how the rules on face coverings will be applied to outdoor services, so please bring one just in case. More details will be posted on our Facebook page nearer the time, including a move to St Michael's if the weather is not suitable for outdoor services.

Finally, on Wednesday 12th I am meeting with the ministry team to try and put a plan together on what church services might look like going forward. Planning anything long term is a challenge at the moment, but if you have any thoughts on what the church should look like, please do let me know.

We pray for God's blessing to get us through these difficult times. Keep safe and well. God bless you all.



The Archbishop of Canterbury has launched a 24-hour free phone line for Christian worship and prayer, aimed at those who have no or limited access to the internet. Justin Welby said "With many in our country on lockdown, it's important that we support those who are feeling lonely and isolated, whatever age they are."

People calling the free number will hear a greeting from the Archbishop and can then choose from a range of options including hymns, prayers, reflections and advice on Covid-19. The line – which is available 24 hours a day on 0800 804 – has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind.
